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he systematic acquisition of food, clothing, and shelter was the earliest form of collective human activity, and it gave birth to civilization. Industry, art, and science are all products of a civilization founded on and supported by agriculture. Thus, agriculture, directly or indirectly, touches all aspects of human activity.

While much has been gained during the evolution of agriculture from the origins of hunting and gathering to the cultivation of settled crops and production of animals and thence to the complex modern systems for producing and distributing food, fiber, and shelter, much has been lost, also. These roles for agriculture are of particular importance in light of the increasing number of people living in high-density metropolitan areas.
